At our last meeting much dicussion centred on the conduct of our rides; Points raised: 1/Pace of rides too High.

2/Accidents due to high speed fatigue.

3/During ride should try and regroup. To keep the riders in a group.

4/Adhere to speed limit on the straights but GO FOR IT in the corners.

5/New riders to be put at ease, no pressure to keep up with the experienced riders. Ride within their capabilities.

6/A member to be nominated on rides to act as chaperon for the new rider. Also follow up, by personal contact, later to get riders opinion of the days ride.

Members thoughts on this issue would be welcomed.

Tech. Torque

To clean visors and fairing screens, Apply toothpaste with a soft cloth to the whole area. Toothpaste being a fine cutting compound will polish out small scratches and abrasions. (polish of completely before it fully dries). Next follow with BRASSO and polish to a high lustre. For best results both sides of the visor or screen should be treated.

For alloy components, household cleaner JIFF is recommended. Apply undiluted with a stiff brush or cloth, allow to act then hose off.

A relitively cheap degreaser is one containing 50% Phenol and 50% Kerosene. Mix well and apply with a stiff brush, allow to soften the gunk then hose off before it dries fully. This solution is non caustic and excellant for alloy engine parts. Two or three applications may be required for baked on grime. One added advantage is your bike will pong like an outback dunny.

Not much changes

MURRUNDINDI FALLS

About ten bikes and three ears left the city at 8-30. We stopped at the Preston tram terminus to meet Darrel. chickende out and went in the car with Darrel. On to Whittlesea, Johnny Barker was fined for passing the convoy in a car. Just out of Whittlesea, Greg's Yamaha had a puncture. (I seem to remember something about a Yamaha having a puncture up near Eilion - must be puncture-prone). This delayed him and a few others for a couple of hours. The others proceeded on to Kinglake, and after waiting there for about an hour, we proceeded on. We arrived eventually at a timber camp, after traversing several rough tracks from here we went on to Wilhelmenia Falls. Some of us rode our bikes up the track, partway to the falls, until stopped by a log. At the falls, a few adventurous (and surefooted) souls climbed to the top. After looking at these falls, we went on about eight miles further up the track to look at Murrundindi Falls. These were more comprehensive that the others, but less spectacular. To get to a bitumen road, we had to go twelve miles down a rough gravel track. John, on his Lambretta, fell off, so did his pillion passenger, Mary-Ann. We wventually got to a bitumen road, and went on into Healsville. We arrived there about 5pm and had LUNCH!! We left Healsville, and went back to the Chinese Cafe for tea. We met up with the others on the way when Bill ran out of petrol. Meanwhile, the others , after $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours, fixed the puncture, and continued on to Kinglake where we thoutht we would find the others, but no such luck! , they had already left.
