

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



By the end of the day we were quite sunburnt and pleasantly leg weary. We took the wrong walk path leaving the complex and ended up a few hundred metres away from the bikes which then took a few minutes to get back to. I did hear of someone who was searching for their bike for half an hour!

Back on the dusty road again visibility was reduced to three car lengths. Shortly enough the Lara overpass hove into sight and we headed parallel to the highway picking up Geelong Road near Werribee and stopping in at Hoppers Crossing to visit friends. The F18's were still blasting around well into the evening.

The Airshow was a great place to spend your honeymoon - even if there were 260,000 people over the weekend there to share it with you! After a good hosing down the bike looked like "new".

Thanks to Gary and Dot for their obvious preparation: they went the day before and sussed it out. It gave us an idea of what to expect.
