I joined the ride at Whittlesea, the second pickup, at 10 am. The weather was threatening: overcast, drizzly rain, though quite warm. On wet roads, with Michael leading and Andrew Dunn rear rider we were soon away. I corner marked at the Wallan "Y" junction and directed the group towards Yea.

Passing through Kinglake West a large group of bikes were parked, notably a number of YZFs. Tom and Andi waved and I nodded. Sitting behind Michael now the roads magically dried. Blat, blat! Tom and Sam slotted in right behind Michael, appearing as if from nowhere. Good. Now the Tengai motor had to work a little harder!

I love sweeping down Junction Hill. All too soon we were in Yea, the rain closing in. Michael called the group together to discuss his planned route (pre-riden the day before) across to Alexandra via Molesworth, on to Eildon and Jamieson (dirt equals mud equals fear!), pick up the highway near Mansfield and on to Mt Buller. Somewhere in the vicinity of a 650 km round trip. When a show of hands was called for, it appeared as if Michael and I were the only takers. So Michael reluctantly bowed to wishes of the group and took the direct highway route to Mansfield.

It was going to be a day of high attrition: already we had lost Damien on his CB250, and with the discovery of a blown rear shock absorber on Tom's bike, Tom and Andi departed as well. We proceeded to Mansfield for lunch where Andrew Douglas and Richard caught us up. Then on to Mt Buller after refuelling.

The road up Mt Buller was dry and inviting. Michael, though giving his beast the berries, waved me by. Marty came too and then he also disappeared from view, just as Sam loomed up in my mirrors. There was nought I could do, altitude sapping the meagre horsepower. He swept by. The road turned wet and slippery and Sam slowed. We travelled together to the summit where visibility dropped to 10 metres in the thick fog and pouring rain. It was atrocious weather, so bad it was fun, in a masochistic sort of way.

We were now on the rough, boulder strewn, steep dirt road heading to the summit car park. Then I was alone. And lost! The sign said 6 km to somewhere I had never heard of. Oops. I turned gingerly around and headed back.

The group was sheltering at the end of the bitumen, helmets on. We "gridded up" at a relatively safe spot below the summit township for the roll race. Michael headed down to what would be the finish line which felt like only a couple of kms away. Once everyone was settled we were off. Alec was never headed, Tony Schrader pipping me for second by a few metres. We carried on rolling for many more kilometres until I saw Ian and John (black FZR) making ground. I tipped the bike into a left hand corner carrying a little excess speed and the front tyre wasn't up to the task. I got a bit muddy, broke a blinker lens, and bent the gear change lever. Thanks to those chaps who heaved the bike back onto the road.

Back to Mansfield for afternoon tea and more fuel. It was still pouring rain so we then headed straight for Yea to break up. Around 4 pm on the Goulburn Valley Highway between Yarck and Molesworth I noticed a car "parked" in the reeds off in the swamp. It turned out that Andrew Dunn witnessed a poor overtaking move (by a car), forcing the oncoming vehicle off the road. He gave pursuit, informed the driver of the situation, and later made a police report. The driver was charged with a number of serious offences.

Marty followed me back home from Yea through Flowerdale and Kinglake. He was in a high state of excitement when he took his helmet off. I thought it was a bit slippery. Suffice to say he put a Sportmax on the front for the following week's Clipsone ride day at Winton where he got into the 1 minute, 14 second bracket.

Thanks Michael for leading on such a dismal weather day and congratulations to Alec (and Kylie) who rode smart and well, and Tony for coming out of nowhere, and everyone else for taking part.

_DARWIN_or_BUST_-_1994:-

Last February my brother-in-law Eddie suggested a trip to Darwin at Christmas, so I agreed and here we are.

Boxing Day and after bacon & eggs at my sisters, we start off on a Melbourne Summer Day — windy, cold and wet — something that was to continue until well past Ballarat. I was on the Dominator and Eddie was on a 30,000km old Suzuki Dakar 600, 1987 kickstart model. The Dakar had already done this trip before with its previous owner. After much consideration I'd rejected the idea of a peaked full-face helmet although the advantage of keeping the sun out of your eyes was weighed up against the wind trying to rip your head off during the whole trip.

Instead I duct-taped the top of my full-face helmet visor so that the tape line

Instead I duct-taped the top of my full-face helmet visor so that the tape line almost touched the horizon when being worn and then bought a good pair of sunglasses. This proved perfect throughout the trip and also saved the cost of a new helmet, Eddie had an open-face with peak and goggles plus face scarf but unfortunately still suffered first from the cold and then the heat.

Gear taken was light; a tent, foam bed mat and a few clothes. Even so, at Alice Springs I did a re-think and sent home 8 kilograms including the lock and chain. I'd decided that the Abo's weren't going to steal my bike after all. We made Ballarat cold and damp so coffee and munchies were had. I'm cold moaned Eddie but after many kicks of the Suzuki when it came time to leave this was no longer the case. I suggested plug removal, kick-over to clean out mixture, refit dry plug and kick. IT WORKED, and continued to do so for the remainder of the trip when the Suzy got a bit stubborn. The Suzuki was to prove to be like a good wife to Eddie, You kicked it in the morning to get it started and swore at it during the day when it got tempramental.

The run to Adelaide became drier and went smoothly until Norwood where we stopped at my cousins for a few drinks then off to an Italian Restaurant for tea and two bottles of wine followed by some Drambuie. That wrote me off for the night however my cousin was fitter and while Eddie and I slept he called up a hooker to come and keep him company. Showed us some of the TOYS used the next morning! Ham & eggs fixed us up ready to leave, except the Suzy wouldn't start. Remove plugs, etc, and off we go.

Into Port Augusta and food from the local supermarket. Eddie is amazed at how black the "blacks" are, he's ex-German and hasn't seen up country before. Seeing them laying around he sensed a business opportunity and started on about the possible large sale of gas ovens!

We talked with a Z1300 outfit rider from W.A. His Bull-terrier had got too far into hanging out of the chair and had bounced down the road. It was looking a bit sad and grazed but still alive. The second day ended 125km short of Cooper Pedy with us camping in a parking area beside the highway as darkness fell. The cold weather was gone and summer here at last. Our tents were the modern easy to erect dome types, with a tent each to avoid each others snores and farts. We wanted to get sleep and still remain friends.

Cooper Pedy was an easy hour ride next morning in the clear warmth of 38°C, which was cool for Cooper Pedy normally 45°C. Shops abound and are worth visiting for history and wares. The Opal Cave Motel wouldn't look out of place in central Melbourne its so smart. Tourists about are mostly Japanese and Germans, not many Australians. The night before our arrival someone blew up a car and house — NOTHING LEFT! A local sticker says "No explosives to be taken into the theatre please"! The underground houses are brilliantly done and control the temperature just right, we spent night 3 at the Caravan Park at \$5 a night.

DARWIN or BUST cont;

Day 4 and we're of to Ayers Rock, photos at N.T. border, fuel at Eridunda and drinks for us before the short 250km sidetrack to the rock. Heat is already a problem with at least a litre of liquid consumed every hour. Costs more than fuel at \$3.20 for a $1\frac{1}{2}$ litre bottle of mineral water. Fuel is now at 94° a litre. We view the rock but its too early in the afternoon to climb. Heat is still too high with climbing time early morning or before 5pm. We ride off and circle the Olgas 50km away, all the roads are excellent bitumen to suit the tour buses. After a short walk through the Olgas back to the Rock for the 800 metre high climb to the top, following the white line and it's easy, provided you have a few short breaks. It's easy to see why some would die climbing as heat exhaustion can be a problem. Again most on the Rock are German, Swiss & Japanese. I find 2 Aussies at the top. Great views from here and what took 1 hour to climb takes 30 minutes to descend.

Night 4 at the Resort Caravan Park then next day into Alice with Camels sighted on the way here we feed up from the Coles Supermarket which is open 7 days and 24 hours a day. Next off to Honda Alice Springs and some bike maintenance where the staff were very helpful and provided oil pans and washup facilities. From here to the Caravan Park and its pool. Up north all self respecting parks have a swimming pool which is included in the \$6 a day fee.

Day 5 is planned for a tour of the sights. First out to Glen Helen Gorge, a 240km round trip. The Suzuki is difficult to restart hot and kicking in this heat is exhausting. Eddie spits the dummy and goes back to camp when he learns we will be stop starting all day. For me it's a breeze, press the button and the Dominator starts, hot or cold.

The Glen Helen tour is worth doing with many gorges and waterholes to see, along the way I found a German couple stranded with a burst radiator hose on their hire car. They had 2 cans of soft drink between them in the $40\,^{\circ}\text{C}$ heat, a passer-by with a mobile phone soon fixed the situation.

New Year's Eve passed quietly in the Park pool feeding the nocturnal wallabies.

Day 6 and we are off to Darwin, Eddie with a new rear road tyre. I'd fitted a new rear road Metzler when the trip started in the hope that it would last out the trip. Darwin took $1\frac{1}{2}$ days with a stop at Katherine. Day 7 and we are in Darwin with friends watching a football match! Its their wet season. Three excellent days are spent around Darwin including visiting Litchfield Nat. Park - lots of waterfalls, gorges and swimming holes and FANTASTIC, a road with BENDS in it. Temperature about 32-35°C but 100% humidity! Darwin is a modern large city with about 85,000 people living here, jobs are relatively easy to get and houses large and expensive. Well worth a visit!

Next day we ride to Kakadu Nat. Park and Jabiru with my rear Metzler dissolving in the heat. Only about 2mm of tread left, so much for plans! Jabiru is about 250km away and has an excellent Caravan Park with pool, waterslide, Spa and pool side meals if you wish! Charges are \$8/day but the first 2 days are the price of one. To see Kakadu you must either pay for boat cruises or fly over the area, both expensive options but the only ones available in the wet season, so with that and all the heat and humidity I decided that would do for the trip and prepared to head home the next day.

Thursday 6th January and I start back towards Darwin as floods have closed one side of Kakadu. I attempt the $250 + 1650 \,\mathrm{km}$ run to Alice Springs in one hit but get caught late at night in a storm and shelter in a parking bay about $300 \,\mathrm{km}$ north of Alice.

Next morning I'm into the back of the Honda shop for another oil change, 3000km comes quick out here!

DARWIN or BUST cont;

I'm soon off and running for Port Augusta, again I don't make it! Cold and tired, in the dark I quit at Glendambo and sleep on the grass behind the Service Station in my damp sleeping bag wearing my Dri-Rider oversuit and my helmet for a pillow. During the night I wake up with ants in my helmet so I shift position on the grass. It seems to work. Next day into Port Augusta and the back tyre is breaking up so into the local bike shop who fixes me up with a \$95 Dunlop. The weather is now cold, very windy and a few showers, still I think I can make Melbourne by midnight, can't I! Thats $300 + 300 + 750 \,\mathrm{km}$ in a day - easy.

Tea-time at Bordertown and as I leave I hear squeaks and rattles, the O-ring chain has died! Very carefully and at 100km/hr I continue on, expecting the chain to break at any moment. But it doesn't and I make it home at 1.30am Sunday morning, although it was a bit touch and go travelling through Ballarat where it was so cold that I'd wrapped my sleeping bag around my body inside the nylon oversuit to stay warm.

The Dominator behaved perfectly with only a new spark plug at trip start and untouched for the remainder. Economy was about 20km/litre which gave about 300km per tank, quite enough for this trip as we did not carry any extra fuel. On our return the only things that required attention was an oil change and filter, a new chain, a new front sprocket and a new front tyre. Not too bad considering the tyre and sprocket had done 30,000km. Now the next task was to clean and clean and clean the bike.

Eildon Poker Run. Sunday 13 February 1994.

Rather than meet at KBCP, I proceeded directly to Yarra Glen, via the Clubs usual route through Christmas Hills, to test and acclimatise to the questionable, front-end suspension settings hastily made having replaced fork oil and seals some weeks before. Suffice it to say that I scared myself silly as the bike bounced and bucked around a few corners. By Yarra Glen the tools were out and with a few turns here and there I was half-satisfied with the changes.

As I pulled into the small car park, I thought that 'our' reserved meeting place had been taken over by the 'YZF Owners Club', but not so; Eric, John and long time, non-member Alex Oberhofer were the proud owners (the latter still running-in). As 10:30 neared, bikes arrived from different directions until, at last, the KBCP group arrived. With Tom and Andy's arrival the YZF total was five (how common they look all together). The next 20 minutes was spent; taking a list of riders/bikes, dealing card one of the day, recording the results and listening to Jack's preamble. 'Don't pass on the left, don't ..., don't...). Posted strength was 30 bikes and 32 people (25 members).

On this bright, sunny and verging hot day, with Jack leading, Rod East rear riding and the rest somewhere in between we left Yarra Glen and travelled through Healesville, Woori Yallock and Yarra Junction. At Warburton we stopped for the prescribed 15 minute, morning tea break and drawing of card two. By this early stage Jack was holding a pair of Queens, Alec a pair of 10's as was Mary (pillion of Tom D). As fast as you could gulp down a big Big M, we were quickly on the road heading for Reefton (Jack was determined to not deviate from the planned ride schedule one iota. There was even a 7.5 minute warning cry!).

A few riders lagged at the Reefton turn-off hoping to score a clear run, whilst others continued straight through. The twisty sweepers before the turn off put everyone in the mood for the resultant 19 or so kms. of tight left/rights. Personally, I enjoy going up rather than down the Reefton as I always seem to run out of brakes in the other direction.

For the first few kms. Andy, Rob L, Eric and myself found ourselves together though it wasn't long after that the pace was on the up. Let us say that there wasn't time to admire the scenery or smell the clean, country air. Before long, with a few less bikes between us and the leader, now, the Daytona finally came into view. Until the end of the run, Jack maintained an enjoyable, safe, 7/10th type pace with only one, small hiccup (which I will let him describe when you next see him).

Cumberland was used as a re-group and a chance to inspect tyre, and in some cases, fairing wear (refer Patrick and others). Tyres weren't the only things that were hot; after all of that 'hard work', it seemed the temperature had risen by about 10 units, not to mention heart rates and adrenalin levels. Everyone had raised a sweat. Relentlessly, Jack continued toward the 6 kms. of easily negotiable gravel en route to Marysville which was earlier stated to be the lunch destination. Not so. At Marysville, we proceeded through Buxton, Taggerty and then Alexandra for lunch.

The long stretch of Maroondah between Buxton and Alexandra saw the ride spread out but not enough to alleviate the usual MCTV sandwich shop rush. By this stage, the heat saw many a little zonked. We parked and ate under the shade of trees and picnic shelter in a nearby park. It was here we were joined by someone, whose name I cannot recall, aboard a GS 1000. His denim cut-off vest sported the Peninsula M.C Club name and logo.

It was now time for the drawing of card three, and just to show how easily fortunes can change; I too, now held a pair of Queens, Eric a pair of Jacks and Tom S a pair of 10's. At this half way mark, Jack and I shared equal lead. I was looking forward to the prize already. Little did Jack know that the leader of a Poker Run is ineligible to win.

Lunch over, we headed over the white bitumen of twisty Fraser National Park road to 'Skyline' then Eildon. I found the 'pinging' of loose stones from leading bikes against my fairing a little un-nerving. Years ago, I lost the rear big time on this stuff; you can't see the loose stuff until you're in it. We meandered through Eildon township and turned off at the

Jamieson road. If this wasn't a hoons ride, I don't know what is. For those who haven't done this road, imagine the equivalent of Black and Reefton spurs put together, double the length, set the flame to high and wait to boil. Oh, and watch out for the oncoming four wheel drives that don't know why there's a white line in the middle of the road. Thankfully, Jack had it in mind not to go as far as the dirt, like I did a few weeks ago, and we ended up on a track by a small, running stream (off the Tobreck River) which was ideal for a bit of a splash. Next time Steve goes in. Here, was also time for the drawing of card four. Alex's and Andy's hands, near straights, were starting to look pretty unbeatable but I was still in with a chance with 2 pair. Alec, too, was a danger with his three 10's, a possible full house. But the day wasn't over yet.

I left for Bon-Beach (near Chelsea) at 8.45 am in pouring rain. The plan was for me to ride the Tengai to Les's (and Jane's) house and then pillion Les for the rest of the day on his GL500 Silver Wing. The northern end of Springvale road was flooded in various places which made for slow going. I eventually arrived right on time, gloves ringing wet, the rest of my riding gear in a damp condition.

Les greeted me and soon we were off to Hallam to meet the others. It was still pouring rain, a dismal forecast for showers throughout the day. Despite Tony's hope of calling the ride off, we left right at 10.15 am, the scheduled departure time, much to Rob's astonishment when he arrived 5 minutes late. He caught us in Drouin for morning tea. (He took the highway, we travelled the usual back roads from Pakenham.)

Les and I hummed along at the rear. The final drive (shaft) is geared for a fairly high 6500 rpm at 120 km and maximum power seems to be around 8500 rpm. It needs this sort of gearing to push the huge tinted screen and panniers through the air. The air pocket behind the screen is relatively still and quiet for both the pillion and rider. I rode with my visor partly open for the whole day. This also prevented visor fogging. Water droplets tended to "bounce" straight into my eyes if left fully open.

After morning tea we headed south towards Poowong taking the more open western road through Athlone, across to Ranceby and south towards Korumburra before turning onto the Arawata Road and its tight twisties. I was surprised Tony took this route, considering the two km of downhill, dirt road. Much to my surprise we caught the two new Davids, going very slowly and carefully in the slippery conditions. Not surprisingly, David (CBR) left at Leongatha.

Meanwhile we headed for Dumbalk and Mirboo North. It was still raining.

I was being more inventive in coping with the tinted screen. With water on the helmet visor, water on the bike's tinted screen which was designed to be looked through, not over, the sky completely overcast and gloomy, and the black, twisting, narrow road blending in with the dark green surrounding trees, it was a tad difficult to see. At times, I was climbing all over the bike, out to the left or right looking around the screen, standing on the footpegs to pick our way through the gravel section, or just stretching tall to peer over the top. But it was fun and challenging. And the tyres (Metzler Marathon rear) just made life that bit more intersting, especially over the cattle crossing (equals cow shit all over the road).

We lunched at Mirboo north, refuelling as well. Buckets of chips were the order of the day, and good they were too thanks Les. I helped Rob take his Tote rubber overboots off to release about a litre of water which had run down his legs into them! Rob ran his engine to dry out his socks and boots. Everyone was in a bright and cheery mood, as we sat under a porch out of the rain. Group suffering is wonderful phenomenon. Marty had obviously survived his Adelaide jaunt, though the previous night's partying had taken its toll as he attempted sleep in the doorway.

Tony gave us 10 minutes warning so that Rob could dress himself in time, and then it was off to Trafalgar and Narrewarren via the backroads from Drouin. We had given up on the idea of going to the

falls. We need look no further than Rob's boots.

The esses before Thorpdale are good even in the wet. Rob particularly enjoyed them, having never riden on them before. (This road and the one into Mirboo North get a favourable mention in the current MotorCycle News in the ZXR, GSXR test. Now don't get distracted by the four photos of your's truly which appear elsewhere in the Phillip Island Spectacular article.)

As we spiralled down the road into Trafalgar I pointed to the large quantity of diesel on every left hand corner. Les, enjoying the ride and scenery, hadn't noticed it till then.

We broke up at Narrewarren service station at about 3.30 pm. Tony informed me that the round trip from KBCP was 330 km. Les and I continued back to Bon Beach for magazine swapping and freshly baked fruit cake and coffee. Thankyou Jane.

Home by 6.00 pm. The Tengai never felt so comfortable or powerful. Thanks Tony for leading in the difficult and unpleasant conditions.


