Phillip Island ride day.

The club has hired the Phillip Island race circuit for Saturday 31 August 1996. There is a limit of 40 riders for the day.

Cost is \$80 for MTCV members, \$100 for others.

The usual deal with the circuit applies, the kiosk should be open, bikes must be road registered and not exceed the TRACK noise limit of 75 dB.

A point made by the circuit officials on our last visit to the Island was that even though your bikes exhaust may be road legal, it may still be louder than the track limit. They have measured bog standard 'blades at the end of the main straight that exceed the limit. This limit is not imposed by the circuit operators, but is imposed on them by the EPA, so don't blow the limit or we may end up losing the use of this venue for social meetings.

Any suggestions as to the format of the day should represented to the committee as soon as possible.
