Who's News July 2011

Club Membership stands at 56 with 55 renewals and one new member **Peter Ng** riding an MV Augusta 1078 Brutale. Peter travels back forth across the globe looking after business while his children are being educated in Australia. We welcome Peter to the MSR fold and wish him many safe and fun rides. He just needs to fix the rock hard suspension on the MV!

The Club web site at www.melbsportsbike.net.au accumulated 508 hits during July, down 44 on last month. Total visits are 70,012 since April 1996. The counters on the other pages after another month indicate that the 2011 Ride Calendar page took 421 hits (total 17,982, down 55) since 28th October 2008 and Great Roads 74 hits (total 4581). Three of the five rides during the period were wet and cold, a good pointer to lower ride numbers and people searching on the web.

For <u>July</u>, the official kilometres (sum of ride lengths) for the month is **1,555 km** (down 150 on last month). Official Club kilometres for the month (people x ride length) is **13,686**. The 2011 year total is **239,331** km; the average calendar yearly total is 327,813 since 2005. The people km per injury for 2011 is **59,833 km** – four serious crashes this year; long term it is 98,344 km per (serious) injury.

The **Club Participant of the Year** is based on aggregate points accumulated at 1 point per ride, an extra point for leading or being rear rider, and 1 point per magazine article (maximum 2 per magazine). Attending one or more days of a weekend event scores 3 points for leading, 3 for rear riding duties and 2 points for participating.

The count is for the 2011/12 year ending the ride before the 2012 AGM in July. After **one** month the top ten positions are: **Ben Warden** (7), **Pina Garasi** (6), **Paul Southwell** (5), **Ron Johnston** (5), **John Rousseaux** (5), **Marc Marais** (4), **Tim Emons** (4), **Chris Pointon** (3), **Damir Djikic** (3) and **Misho Zrakic** (3). Early days but the usual suspects are to the fore except for **Cliff Peters**.

17/7 Email from Ern Reeders re Bill's post: For me it's partly the immediacy of experience: the smells, the slight change in pressure against the chest as you drop into a gully of cooler air, the feeling of changing G forces as you rise and drop into the next turn. And the fact that to ride well you have to have a calm mind but at the same time a hunger for the feeling of those G forces; when it works the bike becomes a part of the body's proprioception and you *feel* your way through the twisties. Plus the adrenaline of a 'moment'! On the downside: (i) the ooze of water slowly chilling your chest when your '100% waterproof' jacket fails on a drizzling day, (ii) pulling on yesterday's waterlogged gloves, and (iii) meeting a 4WD on your side of the road in a blind corner. Cheers from Mt Beauty ... where I've seen only two road bikes in two weeks. No wonder. Minus 4 here on Thurs. night.

23/7 Email from Ern Reeders skiing at Falls Creek, but really missing MSR riding: Well there's always one topic of conversation in the street and it's the state of the snow. The technical term for its current condition in the back country is 'snot'. We've had above zero days and some drizzle; given the amount of cover out there, that means it's deep, soft and wet. I skied one of the lower groomed trails out of Falls Creek on Thursday, with a fresh wind driving drizzle along with it, cloud rolling in and out, and the moisture in the snow making it very slick.
